The dual disciplines of fasting and abstinence have a long history in the Catholic Church. Going back to the early Church, the purpose behind the custom of self denial is not punishment; it is to simplify our lifestyles so that we create a certain emptiness. In this way, freed from all distractions, we are able to hear and respond to God's continued call to conversion and holiness.

- *Fasting* is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics between the ages of 18 to 59 years (inclusive). On days of fasting, one full meal is allowed. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed.
- *Abstinence* from meat is to be observed by all Catholics who are 14 years of age and older. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. "Pastors of souls and parents are to ensure that even those who by reason of their age are not bound by the law of fasting and abstinence, are taught the true meaning of penance." (Canon 1252)

The Catholic Church requires her members to fast on Good Friday (see exceptions on next page), and encourages her members to continue this Paschal Fast until the Easter Vigil, but she does not require this prolongation by law. Catholics are also required to keep the Eucharistic Fast every time they receive Holy Communion, including during the Paschal Triduum. "Let the Paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, as a way of coming to the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection with uplifted and welcoming hearts." (Ceremonial of Bishops, n. 295; see *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, n. 110)

Note: If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, they are urged to practice other forms of self denial that are suitable to their condition.

Dear Friends in Christ,

The dangerous consequences of pornography on the internet generation is being discussed with more frequency and at every level, including in the Catholic Church. The U. S. Catholic Bishops promulgated a pastoral statement in 2015 entitled *Create in Me a Clean Heart*. Pope Francis has addressed pornography more times than any other Pope in the history of the Church, including in his 2016 apostolic exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia*, or *The Joy of Love*. More recently, the Holy Father called attention to the dangers of the internet when he addressed the participants in the world congress on *Child Dignity in the Digital World*. His Holiness referred to internet dangers (i.e., pornography) as "what is probably the most crucial challenge for the future of the human family."

The problem of pornography is real. It's here. It's now. It's in our homes. And the harm it causes to individuals, marriages, children, and families is pervasive and great.

The Pope's words motivate us to do our part to create healthy environments in which the internet is present, including on our smartphones. The Pope's reminder of these dangers encourages us to take steps to protect the dignity of all human life, especially that of children.

As you may remember, it's been almost a year since we celebrated in our diocese our first Safe Haven Sunday with the theme *Equipping the Family, Safeguarding Children.* This was just the beginning of our pursuit to do our part by directly addressing the harmfulness of pornography in marriages, families, and the culture as a whole. This weekend, we continue our efforts by celebrating our second Safe Haven Sunday with the theme *Equipping the Family, Having Critical Conversations.*

In addition to using Safe Haven Sunday to raise awareness, we're providing effective tools to assist you in making your homes safe havens. Many parishes will provide families with the book *Confident: Helping Parents Navigate Online Exposure*, which provides Catholic parents a step-by-step guide to understanding their children's exposure to pornography. All parishes will have two other excellent resources. First, a week's worth of free digital parental tips is available by simply texting **SECURE** to **66866**. Second, our diocesan website features many superb, free resources for parents, individuals, and families combating this issue. Just visit <u>www.dosp.org/freedom-from-porn</u>.

This weekend, our diocese will join the Holy Father's efforts — as will many other dioceses in the United States and around the world. Let's take this opportunity to collectively empower marriages and families by bringing to light the dangers of pornography.

PRAYING WITH YOUR CHILD "If you we want to assist the child in his or her religious experience, an important area which we must attend is that of prayer. Prayer is, first of all, listening to God. It is the particular key which opens up the mystery of God's relationship with God's creature; it is a key which belongs to God, but which God gives to all...Prayer is initiation to the mystery of of God and is, itself, a mystery...our task is that of creating the conditions for silence and reverence which will help the child focus on and listen to God. We do this, first of all, by preparing an environment with a prayerful atmosphere. - Gianna Gobbi, Listening to God with Children As parents, we pray often and earnestly FOR our children. We ask God to keep them safe, to make them well, and to help us as we care for them. But there is another gift of prayer that comes to us; the gift of praying WITH our children. There is a BIG difference between the prayer of a child and prayer of an adult. It is this difference that makes it such a privilege to pray with little children. They lead us to an enjoyment of God that we have been missing. When given the opportunity to pray naturally and openly, the words of children flow freely and come straight from the heart. **OPEN PRAYER** Here are some ideas to encourage open prayer in your home: Model open prayer when frustrated or upset ex: "Lord please give me patience in this difficult time." Pray aloud before taking a trip ex: "Send our guardian angels to us, Lord, during this trip and keep us from harm." Encourage your children to pray before a special event ex: "Holy Spirit please fill my mind with the knowledge I've learned this semester and be with me during my exam. **MOVIES of JUSTICE** Come join our conversation using contemporary movies which provide Spiritual witness to Justice issues in our world. 


